Policy updated to reflect new law (AB1246) which allows the district to adopt instructional materials for grades K-8 that have not been approved by the State Board of Education (SBE), provided that the materials are aligned with state academic content standards or Common Core Standards and have been reviewed by a group consisting mostly of teachers assigned to the subject area or grade level for which the materials will be used.

<u>b. Approve Amendment to Board Policy 6161.11 – Supplementary Instructional Materials – First Reading</u>

This mandated policy is being updated to reflect new law (AB 1719) which require the SBE to approve and publicize lists of supplementary materials aligned with the state's Common Core Standards in English language arts, mathematics, and English language development.

c. Approve Amendment to Board Policy 6174 – Education for English Language Learners – First Reading

Mandated policy updated reflect new law (AB 2193) which defines "long-term English learner" and "English learner at risk of becoming a long-term English learner" and requires

the CDE to annual report to the district and school on the number of students so classified. Policy also reflects new law (AB 124) which required the SBE to align the state English language development standards with Common Core Standards and new law (AB 1719) which requires the SBE to approve a list of supplementary instructional materials aligned to the updated standards..

### Selection And Evaluation Of Instructional Materials

The Governing Board desires that district instructional materials, as a whole, present a broad spectrum of knowledge and viewpoints, reflect society's diversity, and enhance the use of multiple teaching strategies and technologies. The Board shall adopt instructional materials based on a determination that such materials are an effective learning resource to help students achieve grade-level competency and *that the materials* meet other criteria specified in law. Textbooks, technology-based materials, and other educational materials shall be aligned with state and district *academic* content standards and the district's curriculum to ensure that they effectively support the district's adopted courses of study.

The Board shall select instructional materials for use in grades K-8 that have been approved by the State Board of Education (SBE) or have otherwise been determined to be aligned with the state academic content standards adopted pursuant to Education Code 60605 or the Common Core Standards adopted pursuant to Education Code 40405.8. (Education Code 60200, 60210)

The Board shall adopt instructional materials for grades 9-12 upon determining that the materials meet the criteria specified in law and administrative regulation. (Education Code 60400)

The Board's priority in the selection of instructional materials is to ensure that all students in grades K-12 are provided with instructional materials that are aligned to state content standards in the core curriculum areas of reading/language arts, mathematics, science and history/social science. Students in grades K-8 shall be provided with instructional materials adopted by the State Board of Education.

### Review Process

Series 6000 Instruction BP 6161.1(b)

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a process by which instructional materials shall be reviewed for recommendation to the Board. *Toward that end, he/she may establish an instructional materials review committee to evaluation and recommend instructional materials.* 

This process shall involve teachers in a substantial manner and shall <del>also</del> encourage the participation of parents/guardians and community members. (Education Code 60002)

In addition, the instructional materials review committee may include administrators, other staff who have subject-matter expertise, and students as appropriate.

If the district chooses to use instructional materials for grades K-8 that have not been adopted by the SBE, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that a majority of the participants in the district's review process are classroom teachers who are assigned to the subject area or grade level of the materials. (Education Code 60210)

Individuals who participate in *the selection or review of* selecting and evaluating instructional materials shall not have a conflict of interest, as defined in administrative regulation, in the materials being reviewed.

(cf. 9270 - Conflict of Interest)

The committee shall review instructional materials using criteria provided in law and administrative regulation, and shall provide the Board with documentation supporting its recommendation.

All recommended instructional materials shall be available for public inspection at the district office.

(cf. 5020 – Parent Rights and Responsibilities)

The district may pilot instructional materials, using a representative sample of classrooms for a specified period of time during a school year, in order to determine how well the materials support the district's curricular goals and academic standards. Feedback from teachers piloting the materials shall be made available to the Board before the materials are adopted.

Public Hearing on Sufficiency of Instructional Materials

The Board shall annually conduct one or more public hearings on the sufficiency of the district's *textbooks and* instructional materials. (Education Code 60119; 5 CCR 9531)

Series 6000 Instruction BP 6161.1(c)

The hearing shall be held on or before the end of the eighth week from the first day students attend school for that year. (Education Code 60119)

The Board encourages participation by parents/guardians, teachers, interested community members, and bargaining unit leaders at the hearing. Ten days prior to the hearing, the Superintendent or designee shall post a notice and in three public places within the district containing the time, place and purpose of the hearing. The hearing shall not take pace during or immediately following school hours. (Education Code 60119)

At the hearing(s), the Board shall determine, through a resolution, whether each student in each school, including each English learner, has sufficient textbooks and/or instructional materials in each of the following subjects which are aligned to the state content standards adopted pursuant to Education Code 60605 or the Common Core Standards adopted pursuant to Education Code 60605.8 and which are consistent with the content and cycles of the state's curriculum frameworks. Sufficiency of instructional materials shall be determined in each of the following subjects: (Education Code 60119)

1. Mathematics

(cf. 6142.92 – Mathematics Instruction)

2. Science

(cf. 6142.93 - Science Instruction)

3. History-Social Science

(cf. 6142.94 – History-Social Science Instruction

4. English/language arts, including the English language development component of an adopted program.

(cf. 6142.91 – English/Language Arts Instruction) (cf. 6174 – Education for English Language Learners)

5. Foreign language

(cf. 6142.2 0 World/Foreign Language Instruction)

Series 6000 Instruction BP 6161.1(d)

6. Health

(cf. 6142.8 – Comprehensive Health Education)

The Board shall determine the availability of science laboratory equipment, as applicable to science laboratory courses offered in grades 9-12. (*Education Code 60119*)

In making these determinations, the Board shall consider whether each student has sufficient textbooks and/or instructional materials to use in class and to take home. However, this does not require that each student have two sets of materials. The materials may be in a digital format as long as each student, at a minimum, has and can access the same materials in the class and to take home as all other students in the same class or course in the district and has the ability to use and access them at home. However, the materials shall not be considered sufficient if they are photocopied sheets from only a portion of a textbook or instructional materials copied to address a shortage. (Education Code 60119)

The Board shall also make a determination that all students within the district who are enrolled in the same course have "identical" standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials from the same adoption cycle, as defined in Education Code 1240.3, and 60119 60422. (Education Code 1240.3, 42605)

If the Board determines that there are insufficient textbooks and/or instructional materials, the Board it shall provide information to classroom teachers and the public setting forth, for each school in which an insufficiency exists, the percentage of students who lack sufficient standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials in each subject area, and the reasons that each student does not have sufficient textbooks and/or instructional materials. The Board shall take any action, except an action that would require reimbursement by the Commission of State Mandates, to ensure that each student has sufficient materials within two months of the beginning of the school year in which the determination is made. (Education Code 60119)

### **Complaints**

Complaints concerning instructional materials shall be handled in accordance with law, Board policy and administrative regulation.

The Governing Board encourages teachers to the use of supplementary instructional materials which are relevant to curriculum objectives and compatible with district goals and objectives. By using such materials, teachers can introduce content and instructional strategies that enrich the curriculum and enhance student learning. Such materials shall be aligned with district goals, curriculum objectives, and academic standards and shall supplement and not supplant the use of Board-adopted basic instructional materials that serve as the primary learning resources. help students make critical judgments, and stimulate their intellectual growth.

Supplementary instructional materials include, but are not limited to, instructional materials that are designed to serve one or more of the following purposes: (Education Code 60010)

- 1. To provide more complete coverage of one or more subjects included in a given course
- 2. To meet the various learning ability levels of students in a given age group or grade level
- 3. To meet the diverse educational needs of students with a language disability in a given age group or grade level]
- 4. To meet the diverse educational needs of students reflective of a condition of cultural pluralism
- 5. To use current relevant technology that further engages interactive learning in the classroom and beyond

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Teachers shall carefully preview all supplementary instructional materials in order to ensure that, in their professional judgment, the materials are:

1. Directly related to the course of study in which they are being used

## 2. Appropriate for students' ages and maturity levels

Supplementary instructional materials may be selected by the Superintendent or designee, school administrators, or teachers, as applicable, and obtained through donations to the district and/or available funding sources designated for these purposes.

As appropriate, supplementary instructional materials must also be consistent with meet the criteria developed for the selection and evaluation of other instructional materials as described in AR 6161.1 – Selection and Evaluation of Instructional Materials. Supplementary instructional materials shall be directly related to the course of study in which they are being used and shall be appropriate for the age and maturity level of the students. If the teacher believes that the materials may be in conflict with district criteria, the teacher shall confer with the principal or designee before using them.

When using supplementary materials, teachers shall provide appropriate introductory and follow-up activities. In addition, teachers shall ensure that supplementary materials do not supplant the use of basic texts or teaching activities.

All materials must be used within legal copyright limits.

The use or reproduction of supplementary instructional materials shall be in accordance with federal copyright law.

## Supplementary Materials Aligned with Common Core Standards

To prepare district students to achieve the Common Core Standards in English language arts and mathematics and the English language development standards, as applicable, the Board may select supplementary instructional materials from the list of materials determined by the State Board of Education (SBE) to be aligned with those standards. (Education Code 60606.86-60606.88)

The Board may approve supplemental instructional materials that are not on the lists approved by the SBE but which are aligned with the Common Core Standards provided that

the materials comply with the evaluation criteria established by the SBE and Education Code 60050, 60060-60062, and 60226. The Board shall select content review experts who possess the qualifications specified in law to review and recommend such supplemental materials. The majority of the content review experts shall be teachers who are credentialed and/or authorized in the subject area they are reviewing and the remainder shall include appropriate persons from postsecondary educational institutions, school and district curriculum administrators, and other persons who are knowledgeable in the subject area. (Education Code 60606.86-60605.88)

## Appropriateness of Materials

Whenever a district employee proposes to use a supplementary resource which is not included in the approved learning resources of the district, he/she shall preview the material to determine whether, in his/her professional judgment, it is appropriate for the grade level taught and is consistent with district criteria for the selection of supplementary instructional materials.

The employee shall confer with the Superintendent or designee as necessary to determine the compliance of the material with district criteria. The primary considerations should be the educational value, appropriateness, and relevance of the materials as well as the ages and maturity of the students.

#### **Films**

Materials rated for general audiences ("G") may be shown if and when appropriate to the instructional program and related to the curriculum adopted for the subject, class and/or grade level. Materials not rated for general audiences may not be shown to grades K-8 without specific administrative approval and informed and signed parental consent. Materials not rated for general or teenage audiences ("G", "PG", "PG-13") may not be shown in grades 9-12 without specific administrative approval and informed and signed parental consent.

## Education For English Language Learners

The Governing Board intends to provide English language learners with challenging curriculum and instruction that develop proficiency in English as rapidly and effectively as possible *while facilitating student achievement in the district's* in order to assist students in accessing the full educational program and achieving the district's academic standards. The district's program shall be based on sound instructional theory and shall be adequately supported so that English language learners can achieve results at the same academic level as their English proficient peers in the regular course of study.

English learners shall be provided English language development instructional targeted to their English proficiency level and aligned with state content standards. The district's program shall be based on sound instructional theory and adequately supported in order to assist students in accessing the full educational program.

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The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all staff employed to teach English learners possess the appropriate authorization from the Commission on Teacher Credentialing.

The Board encourages staff to exchange information with staff in other districts and the county office of education about programs, options and strategies for English language learners that succeed under various demographic conditions.

### Identification and Assessment

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain procedures which provide for the *accurate* identification, assessment and placement of English language learners and *an assessment of* their proficiency and needs in the areas of listening, speaking, reading and writing in English. for their redesignation based on criteria adopted by the Board and specified in administrative regulations.

Once identified as an English learner, a student shall be annually assessed for language proficiency until he/she is reclassified based on criteria specified in administrative regulation.

Series 6000 Instruction BP 6174(b)

To evaluate program effectiveness, the Superintendent or designee shall regularly examine program results, including reports of the English language learners' academic achievement, their progress towards proficiency in English and the progress of students who have been redesignated as fluent English proficient. The Superintendent or designee shall annually report these findings to the Board and shall also provide the Board with regular reports from any district or schoolwide English learner advisory committees.

Type of Instruction

### Placement of English Learners

Students who are English language learners shall be educated through "sheltered English immersion" or "structured English immersion" *as defined in law and administrative regulation*, during a temporary transition period not normally intended to exceed one year. Nearly all of the classroom instruction in the district's sheltered English immersion program shall be in English, but with the curriculum and presentation designed for students who are learning the language. (Education Code 305, 306)

For the purposes of determining the amount of The district has defined the term "nearly all" to provide that all classroom instruction be conducted in English in the structured English immersion classroom, "nearly all" shall be defined as follows: except for clarification, explanation and support as needed.

When an English language learner has acquired a reasonable level of English proficiency as measured by any of the state-designated assessments approved by the California Department of Education, *any district* or any locally developed assessments and/or using other criteria *adopted* by the board, developed by the district, he/she shall be transferred from a structured English immersion classroom to an English language mainstream classroom in which the instruction is overwhelmingly in English. (Education Code 305-306; 5 CCR 11301)

At any time during the school year, the parent/guardian of an English learner may have his/her child moved into Upon the request of his/her parent/guardian, a student shall be placed in an English language mainstream classroom. (5 CCR 11301)

#### Parental Exception Waivers

When allowed by law, the parent/guardian of an English learner may submit a request that his/her child be exempted from placement in a structured English immersion program and instead be place in a class where he/she is taught English and other subjects through bilingual education techniques or other generally recognized educational methodologies permitted by law. (Education Code 310-311)

Each waiver request shall be considered on its individual merits with deference given to parental preference for student placement.

A waiver request shall be granted in accordance with law unless the principal and educational staff have determined that an alternative program would not be better suited to the student's overall educational development. (5 CCR 11309)

Parent/guardian requests for waivers from Education Code 305 regarding placement in a sheltered English immersion program shall be granted in accordance with law and administrative regulation.

If the Superintendent or designee denies the waiver request, he/she shall provide a written justification to the parent/guardian describing the reasons for the denial. A parent/guardian may appeal the Superintendent's decision in writing to the Board. The Board may consider the matter at its next regular Board meeting. The Board may decide not to hear the appeal, in which case the Superintendent's decision shall be final. If the Board hears the appeal, the Superintendent shall send the Board's decision to the parent/guardian within seven working days.

#### General Obligation Bonds

The Governing Board recognizes that school facilities are an essential component of the educational program and that the Board has a responsibility to ensure that the district's facilities needs are met in the most cost-effective manner possible. When the Board determines that it is in the best interest of district students, it may order an election on the question of whether bonds shall be issued for school facilities.

(cf. 1160 – Political Processes) (cf. 7110 - Facilities Master Plan) (cf. 7210 - Facilities Financing)

The Board shall determine the appropriate amount of the bond in accordance with law.

When a project to be funded by bonds will require state matching funds for any phase of the project, the ballot for the bond measure shall include a statement as specified in Education Code 15122.5, advising voters that, because the project is subject to approval of state matching funds, passage of the bond measure is not a guarantee that the project will be completed. (Education Code 15122.5)

## Bonds Requiring 55% Approval by Local Voters

The Board may decide to pursue the authorization and issuance of bonds by approval of 55% majority of the voters pursuant to Article 13A, Section 1(b)(3) and Article 16, Section 18(b) of the California Constitution. If two-thirds of the Board agrees to such an election, the Board shall vote to adopt a resolution to incur bonded indebtedness if approved by a 55% majority of the voters. (Education Code 15266)

The bond election may only be ordered at a primary or general election, a statewide special election, or a regularly scheduled local election at which all of the electors of the school district are entitled to vote. (Education Code 15266)

Bonded indebtedness incurred by the district shall be used only for the following purposes: (California Constitution Article 13A, Section 1(b)(3) and 1(b)(3)(A))

- 1. The construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities
- 2. The acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities

Series 7000 Facilities BP 7214(b)

The proposition approved by the voters shall include the following accountability requirements: (California Constitution Article 13A, Section 1(b)(3))

- 1. A requirement that proceeds from the sale of the bonds be used only for the purposes specified *in items* #1-2 above and not for any other purposes including teacher and administrative salaries and other school operating expenses
- 2. A list of specific school facility projects to be funded and certification that the Board has evaluated safety, class size reduction and information technology needs in developing that list

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(cf. 0440 - District Technology Plan)
(cf. 0450 - Comprehensive Safety Plan)
(cf. 6151 - Class Size)
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- 3. A requirement that the Board conduct an annual, independent performance audit to ensure that the funds have been expended only on the specific projects listed
- 4. A requirement that the Board conduct an annual, independent financial audit of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds until all of those proceeds have been expended for the school facilities projects

If a district general obligation bond requiring a 55% majority is approved by the voters, the Board shall appoint an independent citizens' advisory oversight committee. This committee shall be appointed within 60 days of the date that the Board enters the election results in its minutes pursuant to Education Code 15274. (Education Code 15278)

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The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the annual, independent performance and financial audits conducted pursuant to items #3 and #4 above are issued in accordance with the U.S. Comptroller General's Government Auditing Standards. He/she shall submit the audits to the citizens' oversight committee by March 31 of each year. (Education Code 15286)

Bonds Requiring 66.67% Approval by Local Voters

The Board may decide to pursue the authorization and issuance of bonds by approval of 66.67% majority of the voters pursuant to Education Code 15100 and Article 13A, Section 1(b)(2) of the California Constitution. If a majority of the Board agrees to such an election, or upon a petition of the majority of the qualified electors residing in the district, the Board shall adopt a resolution ordering an election on the question of whether to incur bonded

indebtedness if approved by a 66.67% majority of the voters. (Education Code 15100)

The bond election may be ordered to occur on any Tuesday, except a Tuesday that is a state holiday or the day before or after a state holiday, is within 45 days before or after a statewide election unless conducted at the same time as the statewide election, or is an established election date pursuant to Elections Code 1000 or 1500. (Education Code 15101)

Bonds shall be sold for the purpose of raising money for the following purposes: (Education Code 15100)

- 1. Purchasing school lots
- 2. Building or purchasing school buildings
- 3. Making of alterations or additions to school building(s) other than as may be necessary for current maintenance, operation or repairs
- 4. Repairing, restoring or rebuilding of any school building damaged, injured or destroyed by fire or other public calamity
- 5. Supplying of school buildings and grounds with furniture, equipment or necessary apparatus of a permanent nature
- 6. Permanent improvement of school grounds
- 7. Refunding of any outstanding valid indebtedness of the district, evidenced by bonds or of state school building aid loans
- 8. Carrying out of sewer or drain projects or purposes authorized in Education Code 17577
- 9. Purchase of school buses with a useful life of at least 20 years
- 10. Demolition or razing of any school building with the intent to replace it with another school building, whether in the same location or in any other location

Except for refunding any outstanding indebtedness, any of the purposes listed above may be united and voted upon as a single proposition by order of the Board and entered into the minutes. (Education Code 15100)

The Board may appoint a citizens' oversight committee to review and report to the Board and the

public as to whether the expenditure of bond revenues complies with the intended purposes of the bond

# Certificate of Results

If the certificate of election results received by the Board shows the appropriate majority of the voters are in favor of issuing the bonds, the Board shall record that fact in its minutes. The Board shall then certify to the County Board of Supervisors all proceedings it had in connection with the election results. (Education Code 15124, 15274)

#### Resolution Regarding Sale of Bonds

Following passage of the bond measure by the appropriate majority of voters, the Board shall pass a resolution to issue the *directing the issuance and* sale of bonds. The resolution shall prescribe the total amount of the bonds to be sold and may also prescribe the maximum acceptable interest rate, not to exceed eight percent, and the time(s) when the whole or any part of the principal of the bonds shall be payable, which shall not be more than 25 years from the date of the bonds. *However, if the Board elects to issue the bonds pursuant to Government Code 53508, the maximum acceptable interest rate shall not exceed 12 percent and the time(s) when the whole or any part of the principal shall be payable not be more than 40 years. (Education Code 15140; Government Code 53508)* 

Prior to the sale of bonds, the Board shall *disclose* adopt, as an agenda item at a public meeting, *either in the bond issuance resolution or* another resolution, which includes all of the following items: (Education Code 15146; *Government Code 53508.9*)

- 1. Express approval of the method of sale (i.e., competitive, negotiated, or hybrid)
- 2. Statement of the reasons for the method of sale selected
- 3. Disclosure of the identity of the bond counsel, and the identities of the bond underwriter and the financial advisor if either or both are utilized for the sale, unless these individuals have not been selected at the time the resolution is adopted, in which case the Board shall disclose their identities at the public meeting occurring after they have been selected
  - 4. Estimates of the costs associated with the bond issuance, *including, but not limited to, bond counsel and financial advisor fees, printing costs, rating agency fees, underwriting fees, and other miscellaneous costs and expenses of issuing the bonds*

After the sale, the Board shall be presented with the actual cost information and shall disclose

that information at the Board's next scheduled meeting. The Board shall ensure that an itemized summary of the costs of the bond sale and all necessary information and reports regarding the sale are submitted to the California Debt and Investment Advisory Commission. (Education Code 15146; *Government Code 53509.5*)

#### **Bond Anticipation Notes**

Whenever the Board determined that it is in the best interest of the district, it may, by resolution, issue a bond anticipation note, on a negotiated or competitive-bid basis, to raise funds that shall be used only for a purpose authorized by a bond that has been approved by the voters of the district in accordance with law. (Education Code 15150)

Payment of principal and interest on any bond anticipation notes shall be made at note maturity, not to exceed five year, from the proceeds derived from the sale of the bond in anticipation of which that note was originally issued or from any other source available for that purpose, including state grants. Interest payments may also be made from such sources. However, interest payments may be made periodically and prior to note maturity from an increased property tax if the following conditions are met: (Education Code 15150)

- 1. A resolution of the Board authorized the property tax for that purpose.
- 2. The principal amount of the bond anticipation notes does not exceed the remaining principal amount of the authorized but unissued bonds.

The notes may be issued only if the tax rate levied to pay interest on the notes periodically would not cause the district to exceed the tax rate limitations set forth in Education Code 15268 or 15270, as applicable.

## Agenda Content

Governing Board meeting agendas shall state the meeting time and place and shall briefly describe each business item to be transacted or discussed, including items to be discussed in closed session. (Government Code 54954.2)

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The agenda shall provide members of the public the opportunity to address the Board on any agenda item before or during the Board's consideration of the item. The agenda shall also provide members of the public an opportunity to testify at regular meetings on matters which are not on the agenda but which are within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board. (Education Code 35145.5; Government Code 54954.3)

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Each meeting agenda shall list the address designated by the Superintendent or designee for public inspection of agenda documents that have been distributed to the Board less than 72 hours before the meeting. (Government Code 54957.5)

The agenda shall specify that an individual should contact the Superintendent or designee who *if he/she* requires disability-related accommodations or modifications, including auxiliary aids and services in order to participate in the Board meeting. (Government Code 54954.2)

The Board president and the Superintendent, as Secretary to the Board shall work together to develop the agenda for each regular and special meeting. Each agenda shall reflect the district's vision and goals and the Board's focus on student learning.

at least one week *twelve days* before the scheduled meeting date. Items submitted less than a week *twelve days* before the scheduled meeting date may be postponed to a later meeting in order to allow sufficient time for consideration and research of the issue.

The Board president and Superintendent shall decide whether a request is within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board. Items not within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board may not be placed on the agenda. In addition, *before placing an item on the agenda*, the Board president and Superintendent shall determine if the item is merely a request for information or whether the issue is covered by an existing policy or administrative regulation before placing the item on the agenda.

The Board president and Superintendent shall decide whether an agenda item is appropriate for discussion in open or closed session, and whether the item should be an action item subject to Board vote, information item that does not require immediate action, or consent item that is routine in nature and for which no discussion is anticipated.

Any Board action that involves borrowing \$100,000 or more shall be discussed, considered and deliberated upon as a separate item of business on the meeting agenda. (Government Code 53635.7)

#### Consent Agenda/Calendar Items

In order to promote efficient meetings, the Board may *bundle a number of items and* act upon more than one item *them together* by a single vote through the use of a consent agenda. Consent items shall be items of a routine nature or items for which no Board discussion is anticipated and for which the Superintendent recommends approval.

When any Board members requests the removal of an items from the consent agenda, the item shall be removed and In accordance with law, the public has a right to comment on any consent

item. At the request of any member of the Board, any item on the consent agenda shall be removed and given individual consideration for action as a regular agenda item.

The agenda shall provide an opportunity for members of the public to comment on any consent agenda item that has not been previously considered. However, the agenda need not provide an opportunity for public comment when the consent agenda items has previously been considered at an open meeting of a committee comprised exclusively of all the Board members provided that members of the public were afforded an opportunity to comment on the item at that meeting, unless the item has been substantially changed since the committee considered it. (Government Code 54954.3)

## Agenda Dissemination to Board Members

shall be forwarded At least three days before each regular meeting, each Board member shall be provided a copy of the agenda and agenda packet, together with including the Superintendent or designee's report; minutes to be approved; copies of communications; reports from committees, staff, citizens and others; and other available documents pertinent to the meeting.

When special meetings are called, the Superintendent or designee shall make every effort to distribute the agenda and supporting materials to Board members as soon as possible before the meeting.

Board members shall review agenda materials before each meeting. Individual members may confer directly with the Superintendent or designee to request additional information on agenda items. However, a majority of Board members shall not directly or through intermediaries or electronic means discuss, deliberate, or take action on any matter within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board.

## Agenda Dissemination to Members of the Public

The Superintendent or designee shall mail a copy of the agenda, or a copy of all the documents constituting the agenda packet, to any person who requests the items. The materials shall be mailed at the time the agenda is posted or upon distribution of the agenda to a majority of the Board, whichever occurs first. (Government Code 54954.1)

If a document *which relates to an open session agenda item of a regular Board meeting* is distributed to the Board less than 72 hours prior to a meeting, the Superintendent or designee shall make the document available for public inspection at the time the document is distributed to

a majority of the Board, provided that the document is a public record under the Public Records Act and relates to an agenda item for an open session of a regular Board meeting. The Superintendent or designee may also post the document on the district's web site in a position and manner that makes it clear that the document relates to an agenda item for an upcoming meeting. (Government Code 54957.5)

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Any documents prepared by the district or the Board and distributed during a public meeting shall be made available for public inspection at the meeting. Any documents prepared by another person shall be made available for public inspection after the meeting. Upon request, the Superintendent or designee shall make the agenda and/or agenda packet available in appropriate alternative formats to persons with a disability, as required by the Americans with Disabilities Act. (Government Code 54954.1)

Any request for mailed copies of agendas or agenda packets shall be in writing and shall be valid for the calendar year in which it is filed. Written requests must be renewed following January 1 of each year. (Government Code 54954.1)

Persons requesting mailing of the agenda or agenda packet shall pay an annual fee as determined by the Superintendent or designee, not to exceed the cost of providing the service.

## Actions By The Board

The Governing Board shall act by a majority vote of all of the membership constituting the Board, unless otherwise required by law. (Education Code 35164)

An "action" by the Board means: (Government Code 54952.6)

- 1. A collective decision by a majority of the Board members
- 2. A collective commitment or promise by a majority of the members to make a positive or negative decision
- 3. A vote by a majority of the members when sitting as the Board upon a motion, proposal, resolution, order or ordinance

The Board shall not take action by secret ballot, whether preliminary or final. (Government Code 54953)

Actions taken by the Board in open session shall be recorded in the Board minutes. (Education Code 35145)

### Action on Non-Agenda Items

After publicly identifying the item, the Board may take action on a subject not appearing on the posted meeting agenda under any of the following circumstances: (Government Code 54954.2)

- 1. When a majority of the Board determines that an emergency situation exists, as defined for emergency meetings pursuant to Government Code 54956.5.
- 2. When two-thirds of the members are present, or if less than two-thirds of the members are present then by a unanimous vote of all members present, determine that the need to take immediate action came to the district's attention after the agenda was posted.
- 3. When an item appeared on the agenda of, and was continued from, a meeting that occurred

## **Challenging Board Actions**

The district attorney's office or any interested person may file an action in court to stop or prevent the Board's violation or threats of violations of the Brown Act, to determine the applicability of the Brown Act to ongoing or future threatened Board actions, to determine the validity, under California or federal law, of any Board rule or action to penalize any of its members or otherwise discourage the member's expression, or to compel the Board to audio record its closes sessions because of its violation of any applicable Government Code provision. (Government Code 54960) present a demand that the Board cure and correct a Board action which he/she alleges is in violation of Government Code 54954.2 (agenda posting), Government Code 54953 (open meeting and teleconferencing), Government Code 54954.5 (closed session item descriptions), Government Code 54956 (special meetings), or Government Code 54956.5 (emergency meetings). (Government Code 54960.1)

The district attorney or any interested person may present a demand that the Board cure and correct a Board action which he/she alleges is in violation of law regarding any of the following: (Government Code 54960.1)

- 1. Open meeting and teleconferencing (Government Code 54953)
- 2. Agenda posting (Government Code 45954.2)
- 3. Closed session item descriptions (Government Code 54954.5)
- 4. New or increased tax assessments (Government Code 54954.6)
- 5. Special meetings (Government Code 54956)
- 6. Emergency meeting (Government Code 54956.5)

Any demand to "cure and correct" an alleged violation shall clearly describe the challenged action and the nature of the alleged violation and shall be presented to the Board in writing within 90 days of the date when the action was taken. If the alleged violation concerns action taken in an open session but in violation of Government Code 54954.2 (agenda posting), the '

written demand must be made within 30 days of the date when the alleged action took place. (Government Code 54960.1)

Within 30 days of receiving the demand, the Board shall do one of the following: (Government Code 54960.1)

- 1. Cure or correct the challenged action and inform the demanding party in writing of its actions to cure or correct.
- 2. Determine not to cure or correct the challenged violation and inform the demanding party in writing of its decision to not cure or correct.
- 3. Takes no action. If the Board takes no action within the 30-day review period, its inaction shall be considered a decision not to cure or correct the action.

In addition, the district attorney's office or any interested party may file an action in court to determine the applicability of the Brown Act to any past Board action not specified in Government Code 54960.1, if the following conditions are met: (Government Code 54960.2)

- 1. Within nine months of the alleged violation, a cease and desist letter is submitted to the Board, clearly describing the past Board action and the nature of the alleged violation.
- 2. The time for the Board to respond has expired and the Board has not provided an unconditional commitment to cease and desist from and not repeat the past action alleged to have violated the Brown Act.
